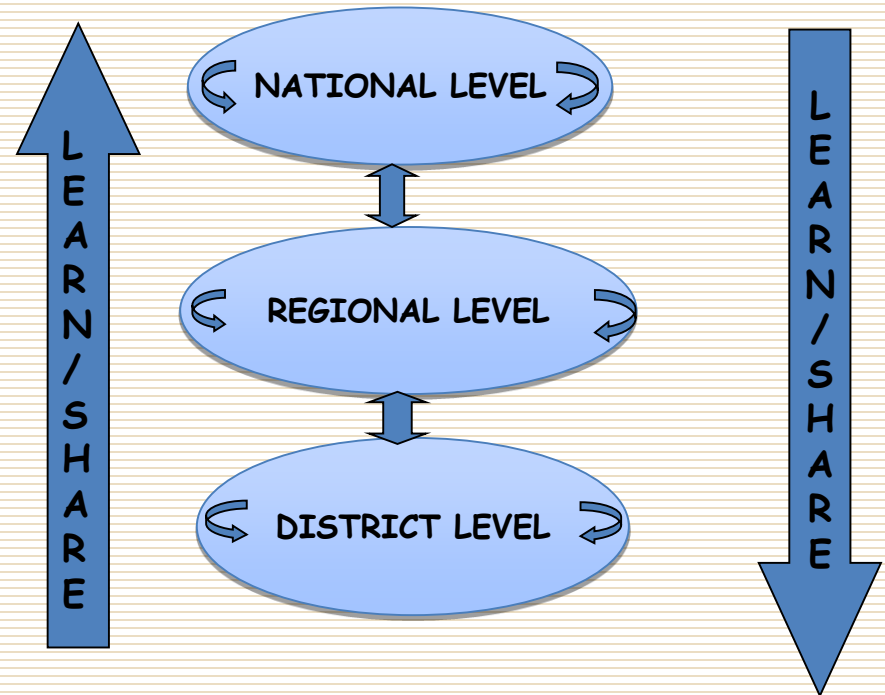

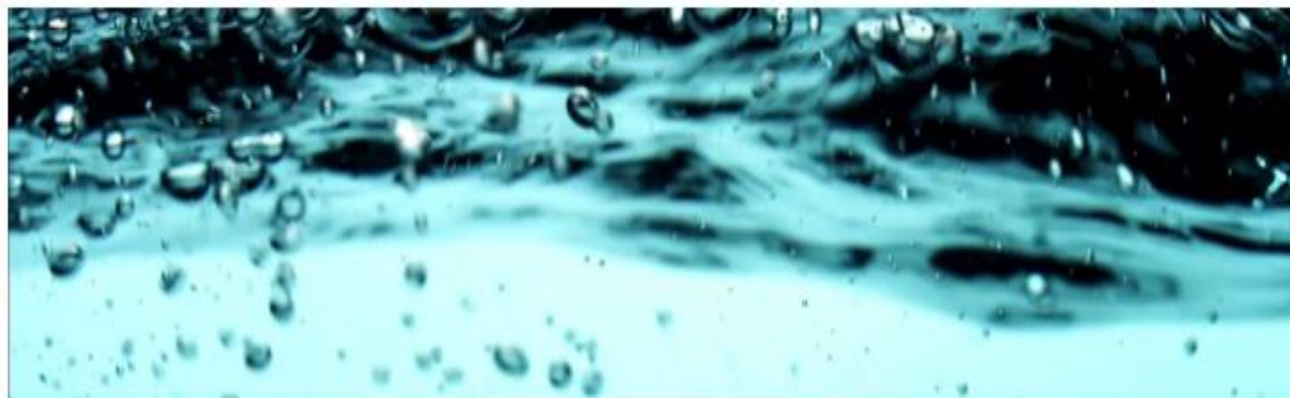

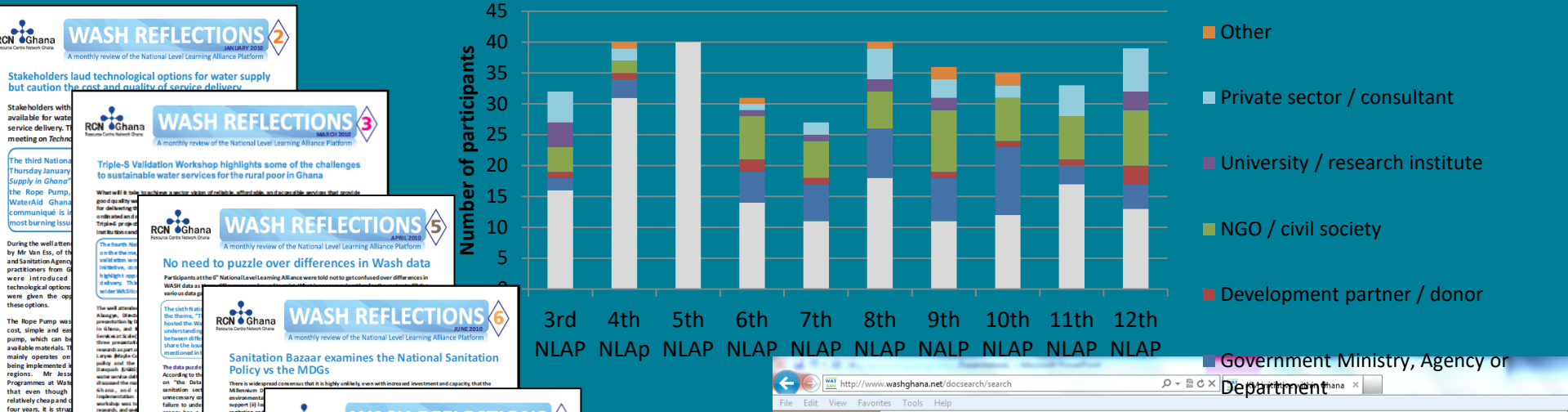
The Resource Centre Network (RCN) and Knowledge Management (KM) initiative in Ghana
