- A good entry point for hygiene behavior change

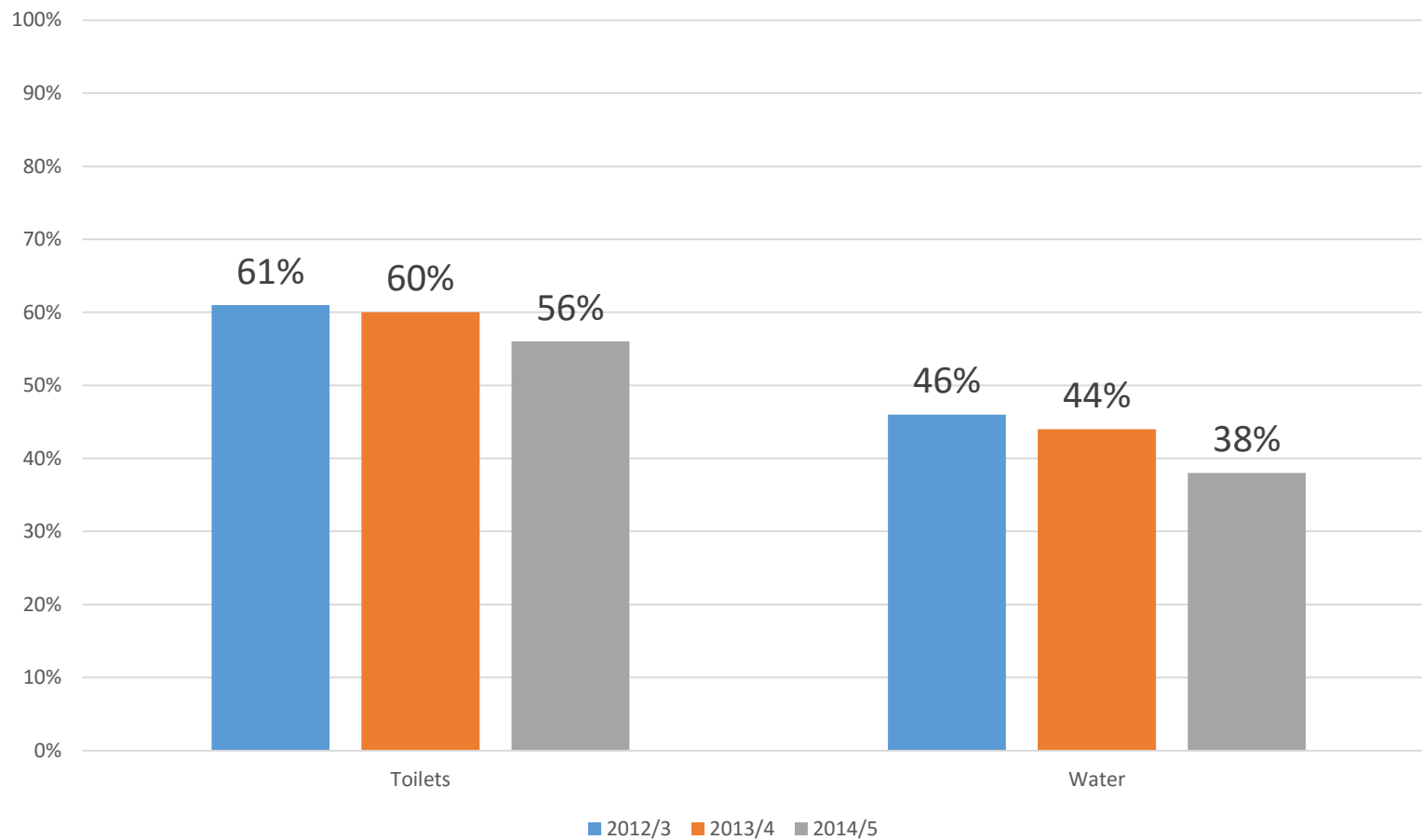

- Children and Youth Ambassadors for WASH



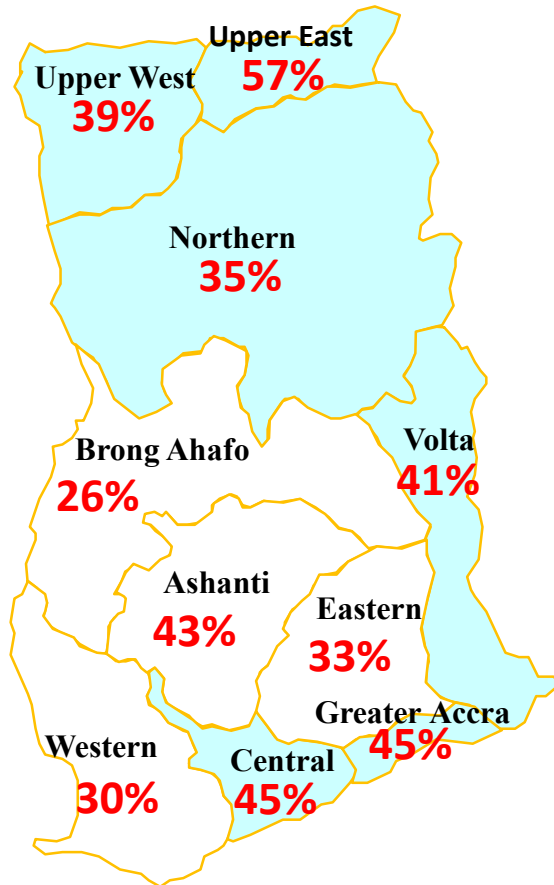

Ghana School Toilet and Sanitation Access

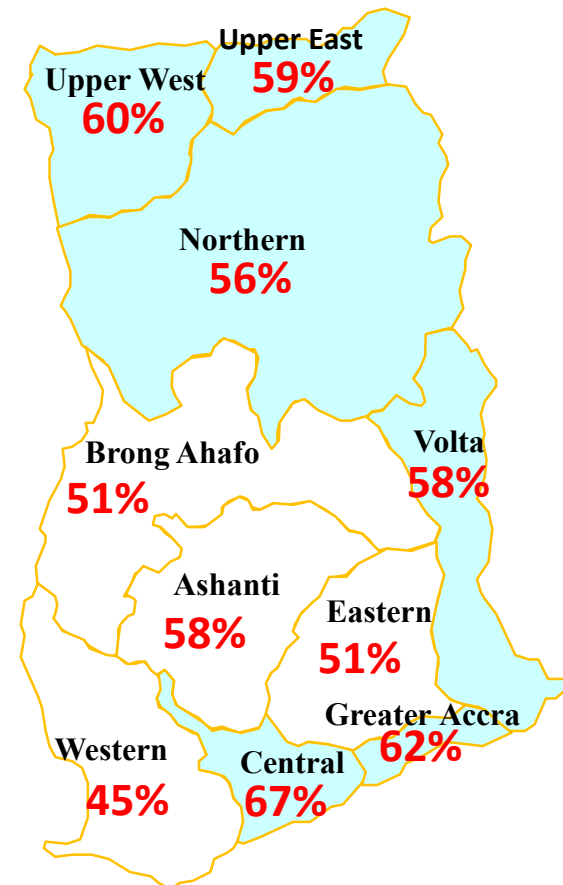


WASH in Schools – Coverage

WASH in Schools Challenges

- High cost of toilet infrastructure hindrance to scaling up
- EMIS provides some data that helps track progress, but nothing on hygiene or MHM facilities
- EMIS does not judge against minimum standards for WASH

WinS SDG

Basic	Drinking water from an <i>improved</i> source is <i>available</i> at the school	<i>Improved</i> sanitation facilities, which are <i>sex-separated</i> and <i>usable</i> (accessible, functional, private) at the school	Handwashing facilities with <i>water and soap</i> available to students
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WASH in Health Facilities

- No data from DHIMS

WASH in Health Facilities Challenges

- Limited data on coverage
- Minimum standards exist but are not well circulated
- Lack of high priority from Ghana Health Service
